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PREFACE

An educational tour is an excellent opportunity for students to learn out of the clss room setting. It provides a chance for them to experience different cultuires, explore new places, and gain practical knowledge that they can applied in real life situations.

The main purpose of this tour is to broaden the student's horizens and enhance their learning experience. As a part of our study tour ,30 students from our class, 3rd BSc Botany 2021-24 batch went on a 5 day trip to ST: MARY'S ISLAND, MURUDESHWAR, GOKARNA, DANDELI from 4th to 8th January 2024.

We were accompanied by our teachers Dr. Nayana jose C (Biochemistry Department) and Mr. Arun Kumar.G from the Department of Botany. The aim of this study tour was to awaken our minds to become future botanists by practically understanding the process of plant identification and collection herbarium preparation as well as to realize and appreciate the importance and beauty of the vast biodiversity of Western Ghats.



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1DAY 1 MALPE BEACH AND ST. MARY'S ISLAND

With all excitement and happiness we began our journey with our beloved teachers and tour guide Akhil johny of aspire on 4th January 2024 at 5.10 am as we boarded Kochuveli Mumbai Ltt Sf Express from Ernakulam town railway station . On the way to mangalore we took our prepared breakfasts in train, and experienced with lot of green fields, fort, beautiful sunrise and many more exciting visual experiences. At 12.30 pm we reached mangalore central railway station. After half an hour our guide spoted the bus for our 4 days journey as we left for Udupi. By 1.30 pm we reached Udupi, freshened up, and had our lunch and left for St. Mary's Island and Malpe Beach by 2.30 pm.

We reached there within an hour and in no time stepped in for boating. The beach is a virgin beach, located at a distance about 6kms from Udupi. It is an important port and a fishing harbour in the state of Karnataka. The endless stretch of golden sand, graciously sawing palm trees, clear blue sky and the gentle murmur of the sea set a perfect tour mood. After 40 minutes of an astonishing boat ride we reached St Mary's Island. St Mary's Island also known as Coconut Island and Thonsepar are known for distinctive geological formation of columnar rhyolithic lava here from one of the four geological monuments in Karnataka state, one of the 34 National Geological monuments of India declared by the geological survey of India in 2016 for their protection, maintenance, promotion and enhancement of geotourism. We spent some valuable times in the Island, and enjoyed a lot with everyone. By 5.30 pm we reached malpe beach and spent some times at the sea shore. We seemed a beautiful sunset and took a walk through sea -shore. After all we went for a small shopping around malpe. By 8.00 pm we reached our stay on Udupi, freshened up and took our dinner by 9.00 pm. With a whole lot of excitementwe packed the kits, scissors, plant cutters, papers, and other equipments



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for plant collection. We all spend some times by talking, playing some tasks etc. by 10.00 pm we all went to bed.



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Day 2 – GOKARNA

The next day we woke up at 6.00 am, freshened up and had breakfast. By 8.30 am we started our journey to the next destination"MURUDESHWAR" temple, which was located ao the town of Murudeshwar in the Uttara Kannada district of Karnataka, India. It is dedicated to Lord Murudeshwara, who is considered one of the forms of Lord Shiva. The temple is famous for its large statue of Lord Shiva, which is the second tallest in the world. The statue is 123 feet tall and is surrounded by the sea on three sides. The temple also has the tallest temple tower in the world, which is 249 feet tall. The Shiva statue there was quite an impressive one and had filled us with a humble sense of tranquility. The temple is surrounded by beach in such a peaceful location. The atmosphere was extremely good & tranquil. It was a sunny day. We had taken a lots pictures of temple, statues and ours. There were several shops near the temple. We had spent some happily hours together at "MURUDESHWAR"temple .

Then we had continued our journey to GOKARNA, which was 78 km away from Murudeshwar. Together in the bus we chilled alot. We reached Kudle by 2.30 pm, we climbed up a hill, and reached our restauraent and had our lunch. After refreshment we went to cottage at Kudle Beach by 4.00 pm, which was one of the many beaches of Gokarna, and is known for breathtaking beauty and hypnotic appeal, situated only a short trek from Om Beach. It is shaped like a prefect sea and is surrounded by towering coconut palms. The beach offers the most silent and serene atmosphere to enjoy a sunset, a walk along the shore or simply sit and observe the never-ceasing tides. The Kudle beach was a very little crowd and quite serene.



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The sea was calm and shallow enough to had a bath or simply for dipping our feet. We had great2 time there by chilling with our loved ones.

By 7.00 pm we returned to our cottages, freshened up and then by 8.00 pm moved to Siva cave, tucked away on a mountain side is an old sacred location known locally as "Gogarbha". Because of the dim light it was little bit strange to reach there .When we enter into the cave, there were a huge number of bats. Inside the cave there was a Siva linga, and nothing to view more in there.

At 9.00 pm we moved to the same hotel that we had our lunch. It was little bit exhausting to reach there, then had our dinner. At 10.30 pm we returned back to our cottages. The night we spent on the beach in a small hut listening to the sound of the waves was perfect.



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DAY 3 & 4-DANDELI

We woke up by 6, and freshened up. There was heavy rain in Gokarna so our whole day plan went wrong. There was a lag in starting our journey to our next destination Dandeli . After the rain we started our journey to Dandeli. Around 2pm we reached dew drops resort and had our lunch. After lunch we headed to do the water activities. We reached our destination at around 5pm and wear life jackets and get prepared for doing water rafting and kayaking. We were asked to wait a while for a raft to be prepared. Then we do the rafting and kayaking. It was a wonderful experience and we all enjoyed a lot. After doing water activites we returned to our resort.

We reached the resort at 9pm and there we had rain dance. After that we all go to our rooms and freshened up and have our dinner. After the dinner we all gathered for campfire. At around 12pm we started to press the plants that have collected earlier. We cut the plants for pressing and make it suitable for pressing. We take a plant press and placed a newspaper sheet on it and placed the plant over the newspaper and repeated these steps. Then we tie the plant press tightly using a rope and then we all returned to our rooms.

The next day we woke up at 5.30 and freshened up and go for doing trecking. It was an adventurous experience. During the way of trecking we collected plants. After trecking we returned to resort and had breakfast. Then we all played in swimming pool. After all we freshened up and packed our bags and headed to Karwar. We spend some time at Karwar market and had dinner and headed to Karwar railway station at 8.15pm and no time we boarded the Madgoan express with heavy hearts but filled with lots of memories. We changed the sheets of plants that we had pressed the day before and also pressed the newly collected



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one and began our journey back to home. We reached Ernakulam railway station at 8.30am on 6th January. The most awaited part of our course had come to an end. The study tour helped each one of us to realise the scope of botany and especially the field of taxonomy. We learnt to analyse the flora of an area and view nature through a botanist's eyes. This was an unforgettable and once in a lifetime experience for all of us. We sincerely express our gratitude to Arun sir and Nayana ma'am for accompanying and guiding us. We also thank our HoD, Dr. Suprabha ma'am, principal Geetha ma'am and all our teachers from department of botany for giving us the opportunity.

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Nature Camp and Field Study Report Silent Valley National Park

Introduction

The BSc Zoology students of The Cochin College embarked on a three-day nature camp and field study at Silent Valley National Park from 16th to 18th November 2023. This excursion aimed to provide hands-on experience with the rich biodiversity and unique ecosystems of Silent Valley, along with an understanding of conservation efforts and the impact of human activities on natural landscapes.

Itinerary and Activities

Day 1: 16th November 2023

11:00 AM: Departure from The Cochin College.

The journey began with enthusiasm as we departed from The Cochin College at 11:00 AM. The students, equipped with field study kits and packed with excitement, set off towards Silent Valley National Park.

5:00 PM: Arrival at Silent Valley National Park.

We arrived at Silent Valley National Park by 5:00 PM. The scenic beauty and tranquility of the park immediately captivated everyone. Upon arrival, we were welcomed by the forest officials who conducted an introductory session.

Session by Forest Officials:

The forest officials provided an informative session about Silent Valley, its history, significance, and the rules to be adhered to during our stay. The officials emphasized the importance of minimal disturbance to the ecosystem and the need to follow a "Leave No Trace" policy.



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Day 2: 17th November 2023

6:00 AM: Bird Watching Walk.

The second day began with an early morning bird watching walk through the forest. Guided by an expert ornithologist, the students had the opportunity to observe and identify various bird species. The crisp morning air and the symphony of bird calls created a perfect setting for this activity. Some of the notable bird sightings included the Malabar Trogon, Nilgiri Wood Pigeon, and the Great Indian Hornbill.

8:00 AM: Breakfast.

After the bird watching walk, we returned to our base for a hearty breakfast. The meal provided the necessary energy for the much-awaited trekking session.

9:00 AM - 1:00 PM: Silent Valley Trekking.

The trekking expedition started post-breakfast. This four-hour trek through the heart of Silent Valley was a highlight of the camp. As we walked along the trails, we experienced the lush greenery, diverse flora, and pristine streams. The serenity of the ecosystem and the fresh, unpolluted air were invigorating. The trek provided ample opportunities for the students to observe various plant species, insects, and small mammals in their natural habitat.

Day 3: 18th November 2023

8:00 AM: Visit to Attapadi Landscape.

On the final day, we visited the Attapadi landscape, a stark contrast to the lush greenery of Silent Valley. This visit was an eye-opener as it showcased the barren lands resulting from human activities such as deforestation and improper land use. The students learned about the ecological impact of such activities and the importance of sustainable practices to prevent similar disasters.

Interaction with Tribal Communities:

During our visit, we also had the opportunity to interact with the indigenous tribal communities of Silent Valley. The students learned about their unique culture, traditions, and festivals. The tribes shared their deep connection with the forest and their traditional knowledge of the ecosystem, which has been passed down through generations. Observations and Learnings

Cultural Insights: Interaction with the tribal communities provided a holistic understanding of the region. The students appreciated the symbiotic relationship between the tribes and the forest, recognizing the value of traditional knowledge in conservation.

Conclusion

The nature camp and field study at Silent Valley National Park was an enriching experience for the BSc Zoology students of The Cochin College. It combined theoretical knowledge with practical exposure, fostering a deeper understanding of biodiversity, conservation, and sustainable living.
